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this snorer com guide does not attempt to explain everything in detail it is intended to provide an accessible evidence based introduction sufficient to help you understand how and when to choose a mouthpiece to stop snoring this starts from a medical perspective and then moves to dental because a mouthpiece may impact upon your teeth and your teeth and other things impact upon whether a mouthpiece is right for you

the function of language is to transmit information from speakers to listeners this book investigates an aspect of linguistic sound patterning that has traditionally been assumed to interfere with this function neutralization a conditioned limitation on the distribution of a language s contrastive values the book provides in depth nuanced and critical analyses of many theoretical approaches to neutralization in phonology and argues for a strictly functional characterization of the term neutralizing alternations are only function negative to the extent that they derive homophones and most surprisingly neutralization is often function positive by serving as an aid to parsing daniel silverman encourages the reader to challenge received notions by carefully considering these functional consequences of neutralization the book includes a glossary discussion points and lists of further reading to help advanced phonology students consolidate the main ideas and findings on neutralization

phonetically based phonology is centred around the hypothesis that phonologies of languages are determined by phonetic principles that is phonetic patterns involving ease of articulation and perception are expressed linguistically as grammatical constraints this book brings together a team of scholars to provide a wide ranging study of phonetically based phonology it investigates the role of phonetics in many phonological phenomena such as assimilation vowel reduction vowel harmony syllable weight contour line distribution metathesis lenition sonority sequencing and the obligatory contour principle ocp exploring in particular the phonetic bases of phonological markedness in these key areas the analyses also illustrate several analytical strategies whereby phonological sound patterns can be related to their phonological underpinnings each chapter includes a tutorial discussion of the phonetics on which the phonological discussion is based diverse and comprehensive in its coverage phonetically based phonology will be welcomed by all linguists interested in the relationship between phonetics and phonological theory
